- Did an artist particularly inspire you?

 To make the change? No, it was an internal decision
- Do you need to understand to love a painting? No, not at all. It is a feeling, an essence that catches you
- Is there a work for which you said to yourself "This is exactly what I wanted to do"? I guess when I started to paint larger scale. I like the physically of it. The challenge, it feels very free at the same time. I like scale of colour in front of me.
- The famous work that you don't like ... Dali paintings
- What is essential for your creation? Space both mental and physical
- What is your relationship to recognition? Conflicted. Some days I don't care and some days I care very much. A fine balance for the confidence it gives and the self reliance I must have.
- If tomorrow you could no longer be a painter, what would you do? Something where I was making things. Something varied.
