#### Your first memory of painting?

I'm not sure, as far as I can remember I've always played with art materials.

#### How did you decide to become a painter?

I felt unfulfilled working conventional jobs and decided I would never be truly happy unless I dedicated myself to art and followed my passion.

#### Did an artist particularly inspire you?

I think Mark Rothko was the first artist I was really in awe of.

#### Do you need to understand to love a painting?

Understand? No. To feel, yes.

# What do you say to people who ask you if you are trying to get a message across?

My only concern is conveying feeling and emotion.

## <u>Is there a work for which you said to yourself "This is exactly what I</u> wanted to do"?

No, I don't know that there ever will be either. Each work feels like a step toward a greater goal. I don't think that the goal is ever reachable or that one work will ever be the peak. I think the journey along the way is what's important.

#### The famous work that you don't like?

There's plenty of works I don't like, but I would never knock them as artist!

#### What is essential for your creation?

Solitude and space. I need to be by myself and have a private space without distractions to work. It's a must.

## What bothers you the most, on a daily basis, in your work?

The normal artistic dissatisfaction and feeling I can do better. But I think that's just drive or ambition.

#### ...And your greatest satisfaction?

Making a great artwork! As soon as I finish it and I know that it's a great work, that's a wonderful feeling.

## What is your relationship to recognition?

I think recognition is just something that comes naturally. I try to share my work as much as I can and a side effect of that is people start to recognize it. I enjoy it but don't seek it.

#### If tomorrow you could no longer paint, what would you do?

I would be devastated if I couldn't paint, but I would love to be an architect.

## Your artistic dream?

I would love to paint larger works, like 40 feet high and 100 feet wide! I will. One day.
